One Day At A Time

Matthew 6:34

Introduction

A. There's a whole lot we don't know about COVID-19, but this much we do know.

- 1. The first known transmission from animal to human occurred in December of 2019.
- 2. Within two weeks, the virus mutated to human-to-human transmission.
- 3. None of us have antibodies against the virus, because it's never infected humans before.
 - 4. And, life is probably going to get more difficult before it gets better.

T.S. – That's why I'm finding it easier and easier to live "One Day At A Time." Matt 6:34 I. Don't Worry About Tomorrow

A. There are a million unknowns about tomorrow.

- 1. Will we catch the coronavirus, and if so, will it be mild or severe? Family? Friends?
 - 2. What about your business? Job? School?
 - 3. How bad are things going to get?

B. I was reading a blog titled, "8 Ways To Lead in the New Digital Default Church."

- 1. And, point #1 is: "Make Decisions for Today, Not for Forever."
 - a. "Here's the truth: you and I have zero idea **what** the new normal is, and have zero idea **when** the new normal will start."
 - b. "So, don't worry about what's going to happen on the other side."
 - c. "What [we] need to do is make the best decision(s) for now, not forever."
- 2. I think that's good advice for all of us.

v34a - . . . do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself.

b. Instead, make the best decisions you can for today.

II. Take It One Day At A Time

A. Today is the very first time I've preached an online sermon.

- 1. And, this is the first time Hillcrest has met as a totally online congregation.
- 2. So, these "firsts" naturally raise some questions?

B. <u>Why</u> have we changed the way we meet? Fear? Disinterest? Government Pressure?

- 1. I was privileged to attend the Shepherds' emergency meeting this past Tuesday, where I saw each Shepherd express their opinions and ideas with conviction and power.
 - a. Fear or disinterest are definitely not the reason for this change.
- 2. The reason for going to an online assembly is twofold.
 - a. First is a concern for the welfare of our most susceptible church members.

- I) It's healthy for Christians of all ages to look forward to heaven. **Philippians 1:21** . . . to live is Christ and to die is gain.
- II) But, neither you nor I want to be that person who brings a virus into the assembly that ends up taking the life of one of our members.
- b. Second is a <u>commitment</u> to being <u>responsible citizens</u> of our community.
 - I) Just hours before the Shepherds' emergency meeting, Cooke County Judge Jason Brinkley issued an Emergency Health Declaration.
 - II) And, in that declaration, he ordered the cancellation of public or social events attended by 50 or more people (Item 2).

C. It is Scriptural to change the way we meet?

- 1. Some probably say, "No." **Hebrews 10:25a** *Let us not give up* (forsake, neglect, avoid eigkataleivponteV) *meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing.*
 - a. The idea behind "forsaking" the assembly is abandoning the church family.
 - b. No one here, especially the Shepherds, wants to abandon worshiping together.
- 2. The Shepherds decided that "Yes," it is Scriptural to change the way we meet. **Titus 3:1** *Remind the people to be subject to rulers and authorities, to be obedient, to be ready to do whatever is good* (also Rom 13:1-7; 1 Pet 2:13-17; Matt 22:19-21).
 - a. So, we reserve the right to exercise the separation of Church and State.
- b. But, to the degree we can, we are committed to submitting to civil authorities.

D. <u>How long</u> will this change last?

1. That's a really good question, because as I was writing this (Thursday), <u>Texas</u>
<u>Governor Greg Abbott</u> issued an executive order lasting 2 weeks that limits gatherings to no more than 10 people, and <u>Gainesville Mayor Jim Goldsworthy</u> issued a disaster declaration encouraging everyone to abide by the governor's executive order.

E. What do we do now?

- 1. You've already taken the first step by joining this online service.

- 4. Be the church. Find ways to Love God, Love People, and Make Disciples.
 - a. Check on vulnerable family members, church members, and neighbors.
 - b. Run errands for people who can't or shouldn't get out.
 - c. Make sure the children, elderly, vulnerable in your social circle have
